EQUINOXES, SOLSTICES AND THE SEASONS...OR NOT! John Nunn

I'm writing this at around the summer solstice, and at the time of writing we've had a lengthy dry spell with loads of sunshine.

I recall we had a similar spell of warm weather and bright sunshine earlier in the year when one could stroll on a warm spring day here on Anglesey whilst being able to see the tops of the mountains covered in snow. This sort of stunning juxtaposition of sun and snow is one of the many reasons I never regret having moved to this gorgeous corner of Anglesey some seven years ago. Having the sort of mind which goes off at a tangent, however, it got me thinking about the seasons.

I've mentioned the summer solstice already, and by the time you read this we will be approaching the autumn equinox when we have equal hours of davlight and darkness. This is on or about 21 September and is followed by the winter solstice (21 December) and the spring equinox. Search start of summer on-line and you'll see that the Met (short for Meteorological) Office says that summer started on 21 June, which is strange since the meteorological seasons are measured in whole months, starting on 1 June, 1 September, 1 December and 1 March. To be fair, they do refer to these as well. However you look at it, if summer starts on 1 June, 21 June is a bit early to be celebrating midsummer. The Met Office does mention the astronomical seasons as well: these are based on the solstices and equinoxes, so according to the astronomical calendar summer would start on or around 21 June and autumn would start on or around 21 September...so Midsummer's Day is also the first day of summer. Odd?

To muddy the waters even more the Royal Museums Greenwich (RMG) also refer to another way of defining the seasons based on biological and ecological factors, such as when leaves start falling. These are the phrenological seasons, and you're very welcome to explore these yourself...search *RMG phrenology* on-line...because this article is already long enough!

By now you'll have twigged that the definitions of when the seasons start and end is fairly fluid. Perhaps there may be some clues as to when the seasons start from the world of literature. Well...possibly the most famous reference to midsummer in literature is William Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. Although the dates around which the action in the play revolves are not identified, apparently some of the pre-Christian sources of which Shakespeare would

have been aware, involving the wedding of supernatural beings (fairies, if you like) occurred at the time of the summer solstice. On on the basis of this information, therefore, Midsummer's Day falls around 21 June, so it follows that autumn begins on or around 21 September, whenever the autumn equinox falls this year.

Whether we go for the astronomical autumn equinox or the meteorological 1 September, on the basis of the weather at the time of writing we are virtually bound to be hoping for some decent rain this autumn following on from the dry spell...very good for seaside resorts, perhaps, but not so great for farmers.

So...does any of this matter? Not in the slightest: we get what we get! This is just a rather long-winded way of wishing all of you, our readers, some suitably wet and seasonal autumn weather... hosepipe ban, anyone?...unless, of course, you are our readers in Beaumaris, Australia, in which case we hope that your spring is all you would want it to be.

AUGUST'S FRONT COVER Adele Kettlewell

The Menai Strait is remarkable for the variety of classic yachts that are resident or regular visitors, many gathering for the annual regatta fortnight. The lovely Menai Strait One Design sloop (a design dating from 1937) is just one of them.

The Puffin's front cover this month features a Menai Strait One Design sloop, MS 12 *Flying Cloud*, sailing off Beaumaris pier on 1 May 2021, a day of picture-book blues, small white-crested waves and a lot of Fifes busy racing.

A brief history of the MSOD is given in the next article, *The Marks & Spencer boats...*

I've always had a passion for art, gaining a BA in Design at Coleg Menai. I work with multimedia in 2D and 3D, encasing items in resin relating to the stories of Plas Bodfa at Llangoed.

I grew up in Beaumaris, and spent many hours watching the yachts racing and learning about their different classes.

I used one of Andrew Perrott's photographs as the basis for the cover illustration, generating an image from the photograph and incorporating detail from an old chart of the area from which the yachts hail to tell a visual story. You'll see Gallows Point, where the MSODs were built, in the bottom lefthand corner.

THE MARKS & SPENCER BOATS...

Thanks to Henry Chesterton and the Menai Strait One Design owners for this interesting history, which was published in *Classic Boat* magazine (adapted by Andrew Perrott)

There's quite a number of classic yachts that are resident or regular visitors to Beaumaris and the Menai Strait: the lovely Menai Strait One Design sloops (1937), the graceful Fifes (1926) and the Mersey Mylnes (1935), to mention just a few.

Plans for the Menai Strait One Design sloop (MSOD) were prepared in the early 1930s, for a boat capable of being raced and sailed in the Menai Strait, a stretch of water that is subject to significant tidal conditions, with a wide expanse of water at high tide to the narrow channel at low water. It's characterised by vast expanses of sandbanks, rocky coves and the infamous Swellies at Menai Bridge, described by Horatio Nelson as the 'most treacherous waters in the world'.

17 MSODs were built between 1937 and 1952. Most have remained in the North Wales area throughout their life, with five being used for many years by HMS Conway as training yachts and one used likewise by the Beaumaris Sea Scouts.

In 1939 it was decided to add the letters MS to the sail to aid in identifying them; this led to their being called Marks & Spencer boats.

The class had a set of two basic values: first, that they must be prepared and sailed with no modifications from their original condition, and second, that none ought to be sold to an owner who showed an intention to take the boat out of the area or adapt it for alternative use. The latter value was adhered to less strictly, unfortunately, which caused the class to weaken, boats to be adapted and some to be sold away. By the mid-1970s the demise in the fleet resulted in few still sailing and, on occasions, only one or two seen racing.

In 1948 MS 1 Britannia was sold to be a launch on the Thames where she had an engine installed; MS 2 Spindrift had an engine installed in 1948 and removed in 1952; MS 5 Aderyn was believed to have been destroyed following irreparable storm damage; MS 11 Ceris was lost at sea and MS 14 Sudy had disappeared. Attempts to halt the class's demise probably started in the late 1970s when Britannia was purchased and returned to Anglesey nearly 30 years after she left. The engine was removed and she was soon racing again. Buoyed by this success, owners of the time encouraged others to join the fleet and refurbish the boats that required work on them. As enthusiasm increased the history of the fleet improved. The framework of a sloop was found submerged, having cleared




herself of the mud that had engulfed her, and was identified as Ceris. Around this time and after much sleuthing work it was established that Sudy had last been seen in the early 1960s in a boatyard in mid-Wales. Investigation established that, apart from briefly being a hen-house, a cabin had been fitted in 1964 and twin bilge keels fitted in 1977.

Sudy was eventually found in west Wales in 1985, returned to Anglesey, completely renovated over a three-year period and relaunched in 1989 to her original specification. Work began on rebuilding Ceris; most of the hull planking had survived despite her ordeal. She was rebuilt and relaunched in the 1990s. This meant that, by the mid-1980s the whereabouts of all but one of the class were known.

What had happened to Aderyn? Now follows a classic sleuthing story, with just the ending that one would like ... The stories of Aderyn were varied; the last reliable reports dated from the late 1950s/early 1960s: she had been variously 'stolen', been 'lost in a storm in '58', or 'smashed to pieces' against the sea wall and subsequently burnt due to being beyond repair.

It was a shame because, as far as was known, the class was just one boat short of being the only 'complete class' from that era in the world. In 1985, though, a seaman travelling through Beaumaris was talking casually to a town resident about the MSOD boats he'd seen in the Strait when he mentioned that he'd seen a similar boat being used with an outboard motor off Lindisfarne in Northumberland. This news came to the attention of fleet members, so another bout of sleuthing commenced.

After several calls the owner of the boat was identified and he was contacted. He'd bought the boat as a small fishing vessel about three years before, but didn't know what sort of boat she was. While he had a mast, he'd never had cause to put it up, so had never sailed her.

After much description of the MSOD's characteristics, the excitement increased during the call as the more the dimensions and details of Aderyn were explained to him the more likely it seemed that this was indeed the 'lost vacht'. Remarkably, her owner even had a set of sails. He retrieved the bag, emptied it and found a mainsail with the MS 5 on it... The search was finally complete, a most satisfactory end to the quest to complete the class.

In the years that followed all 17 boats have been on the water, and all have raced within the last 12 years.

On one occasion 14 of the class gathered for a race where, magically, the first and second boats were accompanied for the final two miles of the race by a family of visiting bluenosed dolphins.

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

Llangoed Village Hall This job involved an arch and planters, and was 'quite a task'.

We knew about the planters; their size and specification came as a surprise. We had to look far and wide to find treated half-round timber, which was sourced eventually from Telford. The rest of the timber and hardware were supplied locally by Huws Gray. When they were finished they were heavy and unwieldy, but the Gardens Team tractored them down to the Village Hall gardens.

Steve Jones masterminded the big Japanese arch, and we workers just cut, marked and drilled as we were told; like Topsy, it grew and grew. Towards the end someone said 'will it go through the door?' A quick measurement: 'no, it won't'. By taking off one component and manhandling it diagonally we got it through...just! Steve made a jig to locate the post-hole positions, temporary diagonals and crosspieces held it square, and installation followed.





It was a bigger task than we expected, with quite a few trailer-loads of this and that and a lot of really useful screws, bolts, brackets, knobs, handles, etc., all to be sorted, boxed and inventoried. 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SKY-DWELLERS NEED A HAND...

Swifts are exceptional creatures.

Living up to their name, they're the fastest birds in level flight, and have adapted to sleep, eat, drink, preen and mate in the air. For millions of years, that extreme evolutionary gamble has paid off, but Angleseybreeding swifts – like those across UK – are now struggling, and their fate is in our hands.

Swifts have long, scythe-shaped wings, whose aerodynamic profile (studied by NASA) maintains lift even against the wind. They may spend the first two years of their lives without touching the ground. They can live over 20 years, and may fly the equivalent of eight return trips to the moon in that time, traversing Africa in search of insects, and coming north to Europe each summer to nest.

Sadly, swifts in Wales have declined by one of the steepest margins of any species (-72% since 1995), earning them Red List status as Birds of Conservation Concern. Part of the reason is likely to do with nest sites, as they nest in holes in buildings, and these can be lost during building work or demolition; but there may be other factors.

According to local swift champion, Roz Hattey, the Beaumaris population has dwindled in recent times, a widely-seen pattern. Twenty years ago, she was seeing many more swifts wheeling and screaming around the town, but now it's a handful, just six adults arriving each May, mostly around Victoria Terrace; renovation work during that time may have blocked up some nest cavities.

Insect numbers are also known to have fallen landscape-wide, particularly in agricultural land, and it would be strange if swift decline over this period was unrelated, and as swifts spend three quarters of their year in Africa, changes to feeding habitats there may be having an impact as well. Pinpointing the cause is difficult.

On a positive note, thanks to Roz and Canolfan Hamdden Beaumaris, North Wales Wildlife Trust (NWWT) was able to install swift nest-boxes on that building in 2019, and as of 2023, there's a speaker playing attraction calls there too, to tempt in first-time nesters. Roz is waiting to see if it generates interest from the latest crop of young swifts. We've

seen nest-box success not far away at Bangor University's Craig Mair site in Menai Bridge, where at least eight out of nine boxes had swifts in them in 2022. We installed more boxes there this spring, as well as a nest camera, from which we're now able to follow a swift pair raising their chicks. There are other boxes up around the town, and on Ysgol David Hughes, where at least two have been occupied.

To build a picture of swift distribution and help protect nest sites, NWWT also set up the Swift Recovery webpage, with the local record centre, Cofnod.

According to local recorders, Llangoed and Pentraeth still have small swift populations, but their status in other Anglesey villages isn't clear, so if you see swifts regularly, please use this system to let us know (the link to *A Swift Recovery* is given below) and if you'd like to help swifts in your area, please flag up potential threats to existing nests, or opportunities for installing boxes using scaffolding.

Alongside promoting more diverse, insect-rich landscapes, there's plenty we can do to give these aweinspiring birds a helping hand.

NWWT has produced a handy guide to the identification of swifts, swallows, sand martins and house martins; the link is given below.

Good Turn Scheme: new Minibus

Appeal 2023 The volunteer drivers providing transport for the Seiriol Good Turn Scheme have undertaken nearly 750 journeys (April 2022-March 2023) in the past 12 months, with just over 10% of the journeys transporting wheelchairdependent people in the electric vehicle (*photo 1*). The 17-seater community minibus (*photo 2*) is used for group outings but does not have the facility to carry people in wheelchairs.

- Total journeys (April 2022-March 2023): 746
- Wheelchair-dependent journeys: 79
- Minibus journeys: 81

As you can see from the graph (*table 1*) the community transport service is getting busier.

The majority of journeys involve taking clients to health professional appointments. Increasingly, however, we are using the 17-seater minibus to take groups of people on day trips. Destinations have included South Stack, the Welsh Highland Railway, and Zip World.

The minibus is a 2009 model and is understandably showing signs of its age. We are very aware that we are currently unable to take wheelchair-users on the big minibus, and they miss out on many of these outings. We can take one wheelchair user in the electric vehicle,

but its range is a limiting factor and we would like to take more people if possible.

Accordingly, we have just launched our Minibus Appeal to raise money to buy a new or good second-hand 17seater minibus which can be adapted to carry up to four wheelchair-users if necessary.



NATURE NOTES: MARVELLOUS MEADOWS AND WILDER GARDENS Roz Hattey

The joy of smelling the first rain (petrichor: what a lovely smell it is, too) as it falls on the parched garden after weeks of drought and cool, easterly winds! Hard to describe, but it has a musty, earthy character and brings renewed hope to gardeners and farmers alike. Mid-June has also brought very warm, humid air and dark veils of low, slow-moving cloud that threaten thunder.

This change also brings out more insects as they rapidly emerge and multiply. It's been a wonderful week for watching swifts, swallows and housemartins as they feed at low-level on the suddenly abundant flying insects in the sultry air. Blackbirds can now find worms more easily and slugs and snails become mobile again for thrushes and

hedgehogs to eat. Read more about local swifts in the article by Ben Stammers, *Sky-dwellers need a hand...*, on page 18.

'No mow May' has been well promoted this year. More people are leaving areas of unmown lawn to see what wild flowers might appear. This year it's been so dry that the grass hasn't grown much anyway during late May and early June. This might be giving a further incentive to try 'Let it bloom June', too! It's so encouraging to see how much more life there is amongst the mixed grasses and other flowering plants of an uncut patch of grass: all sorts of creepy-crawlies as well as bumble bees, hoverflies, butterflies and moths.

Patience is needed over some years before a richer, diverse display of flowers can develop unless your lawn has been well neglected with no weedkiller or fertilisers applied.

You could speed things up, of course, by planting genuine wild-flower 'plugs' into your grassland (available from good

suppliers), then once flowers have seeded and dried in late summer, your new 'meadow' area does need to be cut down. Leave it a few days for the seeds to settle or disperse, then rake and remove all the cut stems and leaves.

In Llanddona, heath and rough grassland on fragments of remaining common land are managed by Menter Môn. These areas are now left uncut until later in the year and small signs indicate why this is being done.

The national organisation, Plantlife, is promoting this more sympathetic management and the signs refer to 'gweirgloddiau gwych/marvellous meadows'. One local resident has noticed an abundance of common blue butterflies on and around one area this year.

North Wales Wildlife Trust (NWWT) reports that more than a hundred new wildflower meadows have now been either created or restored under the UKwide project known as 'Coronation Meadows'. This was launched ten years ago by the then Prince of Wales to mark the 60th year of the Queen's accession to the throne.

The Wildlife Trusts and Plantlife set out initially to select sixty species-rich meadows, one for each year of her reign. Seed is harvested from these special meadows and spread in suitable places nearby to expand the local character of the grassland.

The Coronation Meadow in North Wales is Caeau Tan-y-Bwlch Nature Reserve, near Clynnog Fawr. It is a mosaic of small, unimproved fields, where the drier areas have been managed as traditional hay-meadow for many years. In spring and early summer there is a beautiful array of wildflowers including the gold and scarlet of bird's foot trefoil, small white eyebrights, purple knapweed and the tall, delicate white flowers of the greater butterfly orchid, *Platanthera chlorantha.*

This Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) is now owned by Plantlife and managed by NWWT. The drier fields are left uncut until late summer when they are mown and a hay crop taken whenever possible. Light grazing by cattle follows during the autumn and winter. Last year, seed was collected and spread on roadside verges near the site of this year's National Eisteddfod at Boduan, so hopefully there will still be plenty of colourful wildflowers to greet people in early August!

Elsewhere across the country, farmers and other land-managers help to maintain the few long-established, species-rich meadows that still remain. Many of these are also designated as SSSIs. They are just the remnants of earlier, less intensive farming systems. It is estimated that, across the UK, 97% of traditionally managed hay-meadows have been lost since the 1930s.

Most grasslands have been improved for more intensive agriculture by ploughing and applying fertilisers and herbicides so that many more cattle and sheep can be reared. Livestock is kept out of many fields during spring and summer, but now this is so that the grass can be cut as often as possible to make green silage, needed as winter cattle feed.

On a much wider scale, farmers and land-managers have been encouraged to apply for schemes aimed at improving biodiversity, such as restoring or creating wildflower grasslands and hay meadows.

Various Government incentives have been available under schemes such as the Countryside Stewardship Scheme in England and the previous Tir Gofal scheme in Wales. Glastir replaced Tir Gofal in 2012 as Welsh Government's sustainable land management scheme which can pay for environmental goods and services.

Much uncertainty remains, however, about the details of and future levels of payment for the different types of management required.

Farming unions in Wales want to know what will bridge the gap between the end of this year, when present payments will come to an end, and the new proposed Sustainable Farming Scheme is not due to start until 2025.

On a very small scale, in my own garden on the hill in Llanddona, there has been a no-mow policy in spring and early summer on some patches for about fifteen years, partly to reduce the workload, but the grassland is still not very rich in species. This is probably due to the acid soil, but also we may not have been cutting the grass low enough in

late summer, either. We were reluctant too to remove all the 'under-thatch' of old tussocky grasses that builds up if you

don't cut and rake enough when, one year, we discovered an abundance of late-nesting field-voles, *Microtus agrestis.* Tiny, immature voles everywhere! So, in some places we manage the rough grassland for native small mammals. This should also benefit their predators, particularly kestrels, which I have seen hovering over the garden, and tawny owls.

After planting 'wild stock' primroses and cowslips (available from some good garden centres) on a couple of patches, we now keep the grass cut (or plucked manually) around these plants. A bit of a chore, but it is worth it, as they have been seeding prolifically, especially the primroses, into the adjoining lower-cut grassland. I also intend to introduce yellow or hay rattle, *Rhinanthus minor*, present in the next-door field, to help suppress the grasses.

Other areas of wildflower and insect interest in my garden are simply neglected flower-beds. I have a lovehate relationship with these as I watch my favourite garden plants like oriental poppies, Hattie's pincushion and the real geraniums (blues, pinks and purples) disappearing amongst a mass of wild 'weeds' or seeding native plants. Several grass species, red campion, foxgloves, vetches, meadow buttercup, yarrow, knapweed and ox-eye daisies (rampant seeders from wildflower seed-mix areas nearby) all thrive together, uninvited, and these native wild flowers do attract myriad insects. I watched several small moths feeding on red campion on warm evenings recently. These wild flowers also do very well without my watering them!

In damp places down by the ponds, native plants that I've introduced over the years are doing well, some now needing a bit of management. Hemp agrimony, Eupatorium cannabinum, in particular, is a very tall, strong plant which spreads, but it does attract insects to its large, dusty-pink flowers. Great hairy willow-herb and meadowsweet are also tall and handsome flowering plants naturally found in damp meadow or riverside habitats. Other species growing on the pond margins include early flowering kingcups (marsh marigolds), ragged robin, water forget-me-not, yellow flag or iris, purple loosestrife and water mint, which has a lovely fragrance on hot days. In the water itself there are two members of the buttercup family, lesser spearwort, Ranunculus flammula, and greater spearwort, Ranunculus lingua, with large golden flowers.

There's also the native white water-lily, *Nymphaea alba*, which has beautiful white flowers with prominent yellow stamens over many weeks. There's usually a hum of insect life around the ponds, and on still, sunny days breeding damselflies and dragonflies add excitement.

A semi-natural mix of scattered trees (oak, ash and birch) and scrub (willow and hawthorn), wetland, rough grassland and flower-beds (both tended and neglected) in my garden also helps to support a variety of visiting birds. A few nest in the garden but many others nest in trees and scrub beyond. Residents, seen throughout the year on my bird-feeders, in surrounding trees or on the ground, include goldfinches, greenfinches (more common this year), chaffinches, siskins, house-sparrows, blackbirds, thrushes, wrens, dunnocks, robins, blue-tits, great-tits and collared doves.

Swallows occasionally fly low outside my back door and have flitted in and out of the old stable where they used to breed.

Buzzards used to glide overhead quite often, or perch on nearby poles, but have been a rare sight this year and last. This may well be due to a scarcity of rabbits in the area now.

They have been decimated nationally by the Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus (RHDV), on top of continuing periodic outbreaks of myxomatosis. This may also account for the few fox scats in the garden this year.

Returning to the Coronation theme: a new initiative was launched on 24 June. 'Coronation Gardens for Food and Nature' pays tribute to King Charles III's life-long commitment to the natural environment and organic cultivation. The scheme is being organised by the Wildlife Trusts in partnership with Garden Organic, Incredible Edible and the National Federation of Women's Institutes. It 'will encourage people and communities across the UK to live sustainably and help wildlife recover by growing food and creating space for nature in gardens, on balconies and in shared greenspaces'. A National Lottery Fund grant of nearly £250,000 will kickstart the initiative.

It's widely recognised now that gardens can play an important role in supporting wildlife as well as helping people to enjoy watching it as they grow their own healthy food. People will be encouraged to plant pollinator-friendly blooms, to create a water-feature, however small, to leave a patch of long grass or a pile of logs and to avoid using weed-killers, pesticides and peat!



HUMAN CHESS


Human chess has always held a powerful fascination for us, bringing to life this ancient game whilst introducing elements of scale and drama that would simply not be possible on a static board.

This column is not the place for an exhaustive list of historic performances, but there are some that really stand out. Since 1923 a biennial game has been played in the Italian city of Marostica, with costumed players recreating a chess duel from the 15th century between two knights, to settle their rivalry over Lady Lionora Parisio. Later, in the inter-war period, the Soviet Union took it even more seriously, with a game in Leningrad's Palace Square using actual mounted horses to represent the knights and wheeled cannons for the rooks.

One of the best places to observe a live game these days is at Chess Fest in Trafalgar Square, when each summer a troupe of actors perform famous encounters from the past.

Much closer to home and arguably more nostalgic to those of us of a certain age, is the annual

re-enactment in full dress of the game from the 1960s cult television series *The Prisoner*. Staged by the Prisoner Appreciation Society, this takes place in Portmeirion Village where the series was filmed. The creator and star of the series, Patrick McGoohan (no 6), is the Queen's Pawn in the episode *Checkmate*, which intriguingly is the same piece played by Alice in Lewis Carroll's *Through the Looking Glass* of 1871.

Both of these fictional games deviate somewhat from the rules of chess, but effectively serve as metaphors for the ability of the individual (the humble pawn) to transform itself into something more powerful. In *Through the Looking Glass* Alice reaches the end of the board and becomes a Queen, whilst at the culmination of *The Prisoner* series, Patrick McGoohan successfully undergoes a series of challenges and attains superiority over the institution that has been keeping him captive.

You'll see below a wonderfully colourful human chess game in progress. I took the photograph on 22 April as the game was unfolding in the eqaually colourful village of Portmeirion.

Chess no 4 is not an extract from a game, but is actually what is known as a composition, created from scratch to illustrate the latent power of the lowliest piece on the board.

White appears to be in trouble, being a queen down and facing the possibility of a nasty knight fork on black's next move leading to the loss of a rook.



Logic would dictate that this should be prevented without delay by taking the threatening knight with the c3 pawn. As tempting as this may seem however, white has a far better option, resulting in an elegant two move checkmate.



Keep a lookout for our poster: despite their small size, ocean plankton are amazingly intricate and possess an aweinspiring might.



Surprisingly, these predominantly microscopic organisms, accounting for just ${}^{1}/{}_{500}{}^{th}$ of the biomass of their terrestrial counterparts, generate an equivalent amount of organic material and oxygen each year. In fact, every second breath we take owes its oxygen to these imperceptible wonders. With their extraordinary capabilities, plankton manage to surpass expectations and emerge as one of the two major

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biological powerhouses on our planet.

Even experts in the ecological dynamics of plankton find it challenging to comprehend these organisms as individuals.

The minuscule size of plankton makes it difficult to grasp their intricacies but, through art, we can explore and truly appreciate their astonishing beauty and power, and the forthcoming exhibition marks the first step on this exploratory journey.

You'll see from the picture of our poster that plankton boast remarkable and exquisitely complex structures.

Plankton flourish in a tranquil realm, shielded from the stresses of strong winds, temperature fluctuations, and droughts. Their buoyancy liberates them from the constraints of gravity, while the ocean's turbulence suspends them in three-dimensional space, optimising their photosynthetic capacity.

Combined with their small size, these factors give rise to complex symmetries and intricate forms seldom seen among land-dwelling organisms.

Working closely with artists from the Anglesey/North Wales area, we have provided them with a comprehensive understanding of the role of plankton in the ocean's biological dynamics.

Additionally, we offered them an initial glimpse into the wonders of planktonic shape and form.

Thanks to the invaluable assistance of Bangor University's School of Ocean Sciences and a dedicated team of talented student volunteers, we gave the artists the opportunity to observe live plankton under a microscope. The event was met with great enthusiasm and excitement by all involved.

Don't miss the chance to witness the culmination of this remarkable collaboration. Canolfan Hamdden Beaumaris will house a breathtaking collection of artwork produced by these exceptional artists.

THE ROYAL NATIONAL LIFEBOAT INSTITUTION AND ANGLESEY: PART 4

We started to tell the story of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) in **The Puffin** 41, beginning with an account of the first lifeboats. In part 4, we move to the Great War and beyond.

The Great War, 1914-1918 During the Great War (the First World War), lifeboats were launched 1,808 times and saved 5,332 lives.

With the majority of men being called away to join the war effort, the average age of lifeboat crew members increased to over 50.

The Rohilla The Rohilla, a hospital ship carrying medical staff, had left Scotland on 30 October 1914, bound for Dunkirk, in Belgium. By the early hours, though, violent storms had blown the passenger steamer off course, and she struck Saltwick Nab, a reef about a mile east of Whitby. She broke into three sections, the stern sinking first, killing most of the people on board that section of the ship; those left on the rest of the wreck were stranded as it broke up over the course of three days.

Rockets were launched from the shore, but it was impossible to secure a line to the ship. The raging storm hindered rescue attempts, and the RNLI at Whitby had to wait until dawn broke before sending out its first rowing boat.

The crew members rescued 35 of the 229 on board in two trips. One of the five women rescued, Mary Roberts of Liverpool, was no stranger to luck. The stewardess had survived the sinking of the RMS *Titanic* just two years before.

144 people were saved by lifeboats from Whitby, Scarborough and Tynemouth, the lifeboat crews working for over 50 hours in atrocious conditions. The disaster was a turning point for the RNLI: four of the lifeboats involved in the rescue were rowing lifeboats, and it was only the motor lifeboat, the *Henry Vernon* of Tynemouth, that had been able to reach the remaining survivors.

The *Rohilla* disaster helped convince the crews that motor lifeboats really were the future of lifesaving at sea.

The *Lusitania* On 7 May 1915, RMS *Lusitania* was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine, causing the deaths of 1,198 passengers and crew. She was 18km (11 miles) off the southern coast of Ireland, and had been on her way to Liverpool from New York.

The naval station at Queenstown received the Lusitania's distress call and sent all available tugs and trawlers to the scene. Queenstown's motorless RNLI lifeboat, *James Stevens No 20*, caught a tow to the scene from one of the tugs. It was a grim scene, but they were able to help those who had been fortunate enough to make it into one of the ship's lifeboats, and to pull to safety those few still alive in the water.

14 volunteers from Courtmacsherry launched their lifeboat, *Kezia Gwilt*. Conditions were too calm to use the boat's sails so they rowed the entire 12mile journey, a 3½-hour feat. They arrived to a appalling scene with no one left to save, so did the only thing they could do: recover bodies to bring back to shore.

Of the 1,962 passengers and crew aboard the *Lusitania* at the time of the sinking, 1,191 lost their lives. There were 761 survivors.

The first RNLI Bronze Medals for Gallantry The first RNLI Bronze Medals for Gallantry were awarded in 1917.

The award was created for Cromer crew members who fought fierce conditions for 14 hours to rescue 22 people from the Greek *Pyrin* and 11 people from the Swedish *Fernebo*.

During a terrible storm on 9 January 1917, Cromer's lifeboat was launched four times in 14 hours. Just as the crew arrived back on shore, triumphant and exhausted, they were alerted to the plight of the Swedish *Fernebo*, which had broken in two and grounded. The lifeboat made three brave attempts to reach the ship but the rough conditions smashed five of the lifeboat's oars and washed three more overboard. By the third attempt conditions had calmed and, armed with spare oars and a short rest, the crew rescued the 11 sailors on board.

The coxswain, Henry Blogg, was awarded his first Gold Medal for the rescue. The crew were praised for their 'courage and dogged tenacity', and the Bronze Medal for Gallantry was created to recognise their heroic contribution to the rescue.

The Irish Free State When the RNLI was founded in 1824, the whole of Ireland was part of the 'United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland'. The first RNLI lifeboat station in Ireland was established in Arklow, Co Wicklow, in 1826. Over the next 100 years, more stations were established in Ireland, crewed, as is still the case, by local volunteers.

By the time the Irish Free State was established in 1922, there were 24 Irish RNLI lifeboat stations. British Government agencies, such as HM Coastguard, withdrew services from the Irish Free State, but the RNLI's independent, volunteer-driven services remained.

In the March 1926 issue of The Lifeboat Journal, an article on the roll out of motor lifeboats read: 'This work in Ireland has not been affected by the political changes and the setting up of an Irish Free State Government with the status of a Dominion. At the express wish of this Government the Institution is continuing to maintain the Service in the Free State as well as in Northern Ireland'. Lifeboat stations in the 26-county Free State (a fullyindependent republic since 1949) and in Northern Ireland continue to save lives under the RNLI banner.

The first fast motor-powered

lifeboat Based at Dover Lifeboat Station, the *Sir William Hillary* of 1930 was a response to the increasing number of aircraft flying over the Channel, and coming down at sea, and was designed to reach casualties rapidly.

She was built by Thornycroft, powered by two 375hp petrol engines, and had a top speed of c.18 knots, making her nearly twice as fast as other motor lifeboats of her time. Her onboard electricity supply provided lighting for the crew, as well as powering a wireless radio, a searchlight, throwline night tracers and a Morse code signalling lamp. She was the first lifeboat to have a cabin, giving her crew some protection against the weather.

Her crew received gallantry awards and Thanks of the Institution Inscribed on Vellum for rescuing 16

crew members from the stricken trawler *Blackburn Rovers*, which was on anti-submarine patrol in the Channel in November 1939. After suffering a fouled propeller, the trawler was being blown towards a minefield in a south-westerly gale.

The Daunt Rock rescue This was one of the most demanding rescues ever undertaken, Ballycotton's lifeboat volunteers enduring 49 hours at sea, 25 hours without food and only three hours sleep to save the lives of eight men on board a drifting lightship.

On 7 February 1936, a very strong south-easterly gale hit the village of Ballycotton, vast waves sweeping the harbour and spraying over the lighthouse, 59m/193' tall.

The next morning, the Lifeboat Station received an SOS: the *Comet*, a lightship stationed at Daunt Rock, had broken from her moorings and was drifting without engine power. She had eight men on board, and was so far from her position that she was a hazard to other shipping.

Ballycotton's lifeboat, the Mary Stanford, made repeated attempts to throw a steel cable to the Comet to tow her into port, but the waves pushed the ships apart and snapped the cable. She waited by until nightfall before travelling to Cobh to get stronger cables; her crew had gone all day without food, so slept for three hours and changed into dry clothes before returning. When they returned the storm was still strong and a thick fog had covered the area, making it impossible to complete the rescue, but the Mary Stanford remained at sea all day and night. When the Commissioners of Irish Lights vessel, *Isolda*, arrived to stand by, the lifeboat was able to refuel at Cobh and returned immediately.

The storm worsened that evening, the *Comet* drifting perilously close to Daunt Rock. The coxswain decided to get alongside the ship so that her crew could jump onto the lifeboat. After repeated attemps in appalling conditions their rescue succeeded.

The rescue has become an important part of the RNLI's history, one of the most demanding rescues ever undertaken, and a fantastic example of the endurance and hard work of the crews.

Seven Gold-, Silver- and Bronze medals were awarded to crew members in recognition of their heroic actions during the rescue.
