 Royal Anglesey Yacht Club: The Royal Anglesey Yacht Club (RAYC) can trace its roots back to 1802 when the Beaumaris Book Society was founded at Ye Olde Bulls Head Inn, Beaumaris.

In 1826 the Society moved to Green Edge, where the club house is today. Members of the Society played a prominent part in the Beaumaris regatta of 1830 and in the years to come. In 1885, the year after Bangor University was established, the club became the RAYC after Queen Victoria granted the club a Royal Warrant.

The RAYC has two adopted classes of yacht: the Fife One Design and the Menai Strait One Design.

The competition's brief was to write a piece of Flash Fiction and the theme was 'Wild'. As well as a cash prize, Debbie's story 'Wild at Heart' will be published on the Gŵyl Anglesey Writing Festival website in the near future, and **The Puffin** is pleased to feature it below.

He has the most beautiful eyes; sometimes soft and emerald green, at others hard and black as coal. Right now, they are impossible to describe. The fullness of the Strawberry Moon is reflected in them as he raises his head and savours the fresh night air, his entire being tingling with expectation.

It's midnight... his favourite time... the killing time.

Cocooned in his safe place, he has slept away the day, hidden from curious eyes

and free from distraction. But as dusk creeps in and shadows lengthen, he anticipates nightfall and the opportunities that darkness affords.

Stretching out sleepy muscles like an athlete preparing for a race, he flexes both body and mind and surveys the scene in front of him. Tall trees and long grass provide the perfect cover, whilst lofty buildings, distorted by the half-light, loom up from the ground and counsel caution. Chess and music

I recently spent a very pleasant evening with an old school friend of mine who happens to be a Fellow of the Royal Northern College of Music.

During our ramblings we touched on the subject of the connections between chess and music. Far from dismissing the notion, he felt that in his opinion there could well be similarities between the creation of repeated musical motifs and the thought processes that take place in a game of chess where pattern recognition is an essential skill.

We were not the first, though, to suggest this; the internet is full of articles that refer to it. What intrigued me during my on-line meanderings, though, was the number of prominent musicians who were also half-decent chess players. It would be exhausting to list them all, but I've included some of my favourites below.


In the 18th century François-André Danican Philidor was a French musician of note, composing for Louis XV amongst others. He is remembered best these days, however, as the strongest chess player of his era and one of the earliest to master playing the game blindfold. The first known blindfold chess event in Europe took place in Florence in 1266. In 1783,



Philidor demonstrated his ability to play up to three blindfold games simultaneously with great success, with newspapers highlighting his achievement; he had taught himself to visualise the board while in bed at night when he had trouble sleeping.





Sergei Sergeyevich Prokofiev, the early 20th century Russian composer, pianist and conductor, well known for "Peter and the Wolf", was an accomplished chess player, so accomplished, in fact, that he was able to beat (on occasion) the second and third world champions Emanuel Lasker and Jose Raul Capablanca.


Moving swiftly on to the second half of the 20th century, we find Yehudi Menuhin (Baron Menuhin), the American-born British violinist and conductor, known to many for his prolific output for EMI and frequent television appearances. He, too, was fond of the royal game and after a recital at the Paris Opera at the tender age of twelve, astounded the journalists in attendance by playing chess whilst being interviewed.

I could go on, but perhaps it's only right to reserve a paragraph for some of the more modern music legends who were significant players. John Lennon has to be included in this list, not only for his love of the game, but also for teaching Ringo how to play! Phil Lynott of Thin Lizzy was frequently pictured behind a chess board. Last, but by no means least, is Bjorn Ulvaeus of Abba who, in collaboration with fellow player Tim Rice, created "Chess". the hugely successful 1980s musical.

As a guide in the amazing Victorian gaol in Beaumaris for several years I have been investigating the sort of crimes for which local people were sentenced to a gaol term. My source of information was from the Anglesey Archives in Llangefni

who are so helpful if you are looking at historical documents of all kinds. My basic source was the beautifully leather-bound books of the Quarterly Magistrates' Records showing all the trials and convictions of trials held at Beaumaris Courthouse, another amazing museum here in town that is definitely worth a visit.

The Magistrates' records are bound in leather books for each year, divided up into the four quarters of the year: Epiphany, Easter, Midsummer and Michaelmas. Each quarter starts off with a list of the magistrates and court officials involved in the cases heard during the quarter, and continues, giving a brief description of the accused, the trial and the evidence submitted. In many cases this is quite sketchy and refers to other documents used in the trial. The verdicts in 99% of the cases are clearly stated, however, and it was of immense interest to me that some of the sentences seemed particularly harsh for what, on the face of it, were relatively minor crimes.

My intentions were, initially, to try to show visitors to the gaol what society in that period deemed as being criminal acts and to illustrate how punishments for similar crimes have changed through the last century and a half, but what I found was quite amazing.

Here are a couple of examples of crimes and punishments:

- One man was sentenced to seven days in gaol with hard labour. His crime was "Maliciously damaging six turnips belonging to Sir Richard Bulkeley".
- A woman was also sent to gaol for seven days with hard labour for "Allowing the soot in her chimney to catch fire". This, however seems a little more understandable as, if you didn't pay a sweep to clear your chimneys in a terraced house, the ensuing fire could spread through neighbouring attics and burn down several neighbours' houses; but why was it the woman of the household who was punished and not the man who was the head of the household?





Perhaps in the Victorian mindset the woman was the house-keeper and so responsible for this activity... an example maybe of how our concept of society has changed over the years?

On continuing to glean more and more information on crime and punishments in the Victorian era I concentrated on trials heard between 1829 and 1878, the period during which Beaumaris Gaol was operational. It was a police station between 1878 and 1952, and a Mother and Baby Clinic (amongst other things) between 1952 and 1976, when it became the museum you see today.

During the periods I was investigating I kept coming across sentences for prisoners to be transported to Australia for periods of 7 years, 10 years, 15 years or for life. I was amazed that so many such sentences were given during this period and for the relatively minor crimes for which transportation was awarded.

My interest took me to a brilliant database run by the Tasmanian Library Service, which is free to access: https://convictrecords.com.au. By searching for terms such as Beaumaris or Anglesey I was able to build up a significant number of people who had been sentenced to transportation from the Courthouse here in Beaumaris. During my searches I had contact with some of the library staff in Tasmania and, when they found out that I was a volunteer guide in a gaol in the UK researching transportation, they put me in touch with a Professor Hamish Maxwell-Stewart at the University of New England in Tasmania who is, amongst other things, an eminent expert on the history of Australian culture. He is a Scotsman educated in Edinburgh who emigrated to Australia some years ago and who has become one (if not the) most distinguished academic of his field.

When Hamish found out what I was trying to research he awarded me "honorary" Australian citizenship which allowed me to access his enormous database free of charge which has helped immensely in my research. My involvement in this database was not just to retrieve information from it but to add information about the origins and histories of the transportees that ended up in Tasmania. This has provided much information on the background of these people which is, today, of immense importance to their descendants still residing in Australia.

In another important role, Hamish is generating a memorial to those people transported out there who were essentially the "builders" of the colony out there. They were the ones who built the roads, the railways, the mines, the

ports and dockyards and the factories. When all this infrastructure was complete the subsequent arrivals in Australia were not convicts but entrepreneurs, farmers, businessmen and others who had the infrastructure ready there for them to build on. The memorial which Hamish is creating will be in Hobart and will be a visual system that will illuminate the records of as many of the 165,000 people transported there with their names, crimes and sentences illuminated for today's generation to recognise their contribution to today's Australia.

As part of this illustrative concept Hamish and his team have used modern computer technology with AI technology to recreate the images of the transported people on the memorial in Hobart. Hamish has sought to find descendants of five of the prisoners that we know originated from Anglesey. Having found some, he has taken photographs of them and their families going back in time as far as they can. Using these photos and incorporating the physical descriptions of them written down on their arrival from England, the AI computer technology has produced images that, whilst not actual photographs, are as close to their real appearance as it is possible to create.

One "star" example of this is a young woman called Ann Williams. In March 1842 she was found guilty of housebreaking and the theft of 2 cotton gowns, 1 pair of stays, 1 silk handkerchief and other items of apparel. For this she was sentenced to ten years transportation to Tasmania (then called Van Diemens Land) where, on arrival, she was employed as a maid in the house of the Governor. She didn't last long as she was sacked for being absent without leave. She was transferred to another family, from which she was sacked for disobedience of orders and insolence. Unfortunately this trend continued for some time and she was eventually sacked eight times for a variety of similar offences. Her gaol report whilst in custody is as follows:

Gaol Report Whilst In Custody

29 June1843 Absent without leave. Admonished and returned to the Governor.

3 August 1843 Now with Mrs Solomon. Disobedient of orders and insolence. Two months' probation and had to work on washtubs.

December 1843 Now with Stallard, misconduct in taking spirits into the house. Six days solitary confinement.

13 February 1844 Now with Sloan. Was absent day and night without leave given. Three months hard labour awarded. 9 July 1844 Now with Puncheon. Absconded – three months hard labour given.

3 October 1845 Now with Hudson. Misconduct in having a man couple with her on her master's premises. Given three months hard labour.

10 October 1845 Delivered of an illegitimate child on 29 December 1845.

12 May 1846 Improper conduct and insolence.

In 1852, after her sentence was up, she did not return to Wales. In order to do so she would have needed two things. The first would have been the fare to pay for her journey home and the second a certificate of good behaviour to show that she had learned her lesson. The latter would have been impossible, of course, given her gaol record. However, The man that she had been caught with in her employer's house was George West who was also on a ten-year sentence himself. During their first ten years in Tasmania Ann had given birth to two illegitimate children with George and, when their sentences ran out they got married. They moved to a small town called Mobray which, today, is thriving and in a beautiful part of Tasmania. Back in 1852 it must have been like the back of beyond, isolated and surrounded by dense forested regions, but Ann and George made the most of it and settled into a good family life and had four more children: three boys and three girls. Also, Ann was apparently a reformed woman as there is no evidence that she got into trouble at any time during her subsequent life. She lived until 9 January 1890, which was her 68th birthday.



Ann Williams's descendant, Caterina Gianetti, gave photographs of her parents, uncles, aunts and grandparents to provide the AI programmes with facial features that were used to develop an image of Ann back in 1842. The addition of the physical description written down by the prison authorities in Hobart have allowed an image of the young 19-year old Ann to be produced

Mae gwreiddiau Band Biwmares yn ymestyn yn ôl i'r 1880au, pan ddarparodd Band chwyth gefndir cerddorol ar gyfer ddigwyddiadau'r dref am y tro cyntaf. Ym 1921, trosglwyddodd y band bres o dan ddau feistr ysgol lleol, Mr John Roberts a Mr William Owen, gan ffurfio Band Arian Biwmares a'r Cylch. Tra bod bandiau cyfagos yn canolbwyntio ar gystadlaethau cenedlaethol, roedd Band Arian Biwmares yn gwasanaethu pwrpas gwahanol, mwy lleol. Ei brif rôl oedd diddanu'r llif cyson o dwristiaid a oedd yn ymweld â'r castell, carchar a phier enwog y dref, yn ogystal â chwarae mewn swyddogaethau dinesig lleol, fel gorymdeithiau'r Maer a Sul y Cofio.

Seindorf Beaumaris Band: a cause for celebration!

The roots of Beaumaris's Band stretch back to the 1880s, when a wind band first provided a musical backdrop for the town's events. In 1921, the band transitioned to brass under two local schoolmasters, Mr John Roberts and Mr William Owen, forming the Beaumaris & District Silver Band. While neighbouring bands were focused on national competitions, the Beaumaris Band served a different, more local purpose, its primary role being to entertain the steady stream of tourists visiting the town's famous castle, goal, and pier, as well as playing at local civic functions, like Mayoral and Remembrance Sunday parades.

The early Band's practice venues were varied, ranging initially from a small hut behind Castle Street (known as the Legion Hut), to numerous chapel halls, and even, at one time, a gaol cell. By the 1970s, though, under the management of Mr Edmund 'Ned' Needham, the band now practised at the more suitable venue of the local primary school, and suddenly competitions became a source of inspiration. In 1974 it became the first band from Anglesey to qualify for the finals of the National Brass Band Championships, and came sixth out of the 24 bands that competed.

Despite their success in the 1970s, by the early 1980s, the band faced a serious challenge. A lack of local employment made it difficult to attract and maintain an adequate membership. Instead of letting the Band fade, though, radical steps were taken to secure its future. A recruitment drive was launched at four local junior schools, targeting children aged eight to ten. The response was overwhelming: 42 children, many with little or no musical experience, showed up for the first rehearsal. What followed sets the tone of the Band we know today, which prides itself not only in performing and competing to the highest standards across the UK and Europe, but also in enabling local youngsters to discover the joy of playing together and providing opportunities to develop their musical skills.

By the late 1980s, the Band was rehearsing at its own property on Margaret Street. Following dramatic successes during the 1990s, however, the dream was to have a music centre with additional space and facilities to house the growing number of bands and members. After a huge fundraising drive, the Band was able to purchase and renovate what had previously been a primary school building on New Street into a new band room with large and small rehearsal rooms, a function room and kitchen.

Saturday 9th. September 2000 was a day to remember for the Band, as the official opening of the new band room finally came round. At 1.30pm almost all the members of the band (approximately 140) turned up in uniform outside the old band room to march through the streets of Beaumaris to the new band room, led by Fred Evans. Now the band room is in use most nights of the week as a

rehearsal space, and whilst we hold our large summer and Christmas concerts at Beaumaris's Canolfan, we still hold numerous events in the band room throughout the year.

2025 marked 25 years since the opening of the music centre, and the Band has continued to grow and develop in that time. This anniversary felt like something worth celebrating, and our family of bands were only too happy for an excuse to get out their instruments and play to locals and visitors alike. As all five bands rehearse separately it was also a great excuse to get together, play and socialise, whilst raising funds to continue our work.

It was a hot and busy weekend on 12/13 July: we held our annual summer concert on the 12th in the Canolfan, and were up early on the 13th to celebrate in style. Many of our younger members met in Llangoed to do a sponsored walk to the green in Beaumaris, where we were met with cold drinks and hot dogs prepared by members of our LSW (Last of the Summer Wind) band. Pete Cowlishaw, our youth band leader, was in his element leading games for the children, whilst older band members caught up in the sunshine. Finally, Maggie Williams, Fred Evans, and our musical director Bari Gwilliam led the different bands through a variety of foot tapping music. What a day! The sun was out, Beaumaris was busy, and it was a pleasure to play to a great crowd.

As winter now draws in, we've had to put away our sun hats and are looking forward to the Christmas period, when brass bands really come into their own. Look out for us playing around Beaumaris and at nearby towns and events, and don't forget to get your tickets for one of our Christmas concerts, which will be held on 5/6 December at the Canolfan. Bro Seiriol Churches news

Our church at Beaumaris is dedicated to two important saints, St Mary (the mother of Jesus) and St Nicholas ("Santa Claus"), both of whom are particularly associated with the season of Christmas.

We are probably all familiar with Mary from the accounts contained within the gospels and retold through popular school nativity plays, carols and Christmas cards. However, I wonder how much you know about St Nicholas. All of us know about "Santa", "Father Christmas" or "Siôn Corn" and the many stories and legends which accompany him linking into our "Christmas" celebrations. But what about the man behind the many names he has become known by?

St Nicholas was a Greek Christian who lived during the early 4th century, going on to become Bishop of Myra (located in what is now modern Turkey) during times of great change within the life of

the early church. Nicholas was upheld as a "hero of the faith" in sharing the good news of God's love, and remembered especially for his generosity and kindness towards others. In recognition of his special holiness as a follower of Jesus he became recognised as a saint. His feast day falls on 6 December each year.

Traditions were passed down through the centuries of his special care for children. One account describes how he rescued three poor girls from potential human trafficking (prostitution) by providing money to be offered as dowries for them, dropping the bags of gold anonymously down the chimney of their house. Another more gruesome story tells how he saved three children who were at the point of being killed and pickled by a rogue butcher during a time of famine (this story is depicted in the stained-glass window at the Lady Chapel in Beaumaris Church which features St Nicholas and two children in a "pickling tub").

From early times, especially in relation to the famous Italian port of Bari, St Nicholas's chief fame was as the patron saint of sailors. Stories tell of his calming a storm at sea and saving three innocent soldiers from wrongful execution. This is why many churches dedicated to St Nicholas can be found in coastal areas. It was probably for this reason that Beaumaris Church was partly dedicated in his honour as the growing town in the 14th century became the major port for the Isle of Anglesey.

Thinking about Christmas traditions relating to St Nicholas, we will be holding a special Craft Open Day for Children and Families at Beaumaris Church on Saturday 29 November between 10.00am and 4.00pm. The day will also link in with other activities around the town being held at the lorwerth Rowlands Centre (the Scouts will be providing hot dogs/soup and there will be various stalls run by community organisations), a Christmas Craft Fair at the Bulkeley Hotel (North Wales Craftworkers), and other events throughout the weekend.

On the weekend of his feast day, we will also be holding a special "Celebrating St Nicholas" Family Service at Beaumaris Church on Sunday 7 December at 11.00am.

These Church events are free: everyone is welcome! Do come along to discover more about St Nicholas!

Nature notes: moths

It's 11 August and I've just spotted a huge, dark, banded creature amongst the willow-herb and rough grass on the edge of my tiny 'lawn' in Beaumaris. At first sight it resembles an enormous bird dropping, then you notice the two sets of 'eyes' at the paler end of the four-inchlong body and you don't quite know what it is. The body is a shiny grey-green colour and with the yellow and black bands it somehow makes you think it could be a small snake. I soon recognise it though as one of the impressive Hawkmoth caterpillars.

This is the larva of the Elephant Hawkmoth, *Deilephila elpenor*, and it's probably searching for a place to pupate and spend the winter.

The next day, a young friend called in to see me with her dad. Amy is just five years old but she is already keen to learn all about wildlife, including creepycrawlies. I showed her a life-size illustration of the giant caterpillar which she was thrilled to see. Amy was even more excited when I showed her the large colourful moth with swept-back wings that the caterpillar will change into later on. An early introduction to metamorphosis. "Green with pink marks!" she exclaimed, then added, "Dad found a really green one on the window at home! Dad told me it was one of the Emerald moths." These are indeed wonderful shades of blue-green.

About a week later, I was out in my garden at dusk watering pots and had stooped down to sniff an Evening Primrose flower. I immediately heard a soft whirring of wings right by my ear and was pleased to see a dark, patterned moth, medium size. approaching the same flower. It started feeding with its proboscis on nectar in the centre of the large flower. It was obviously getting dusted with pollen from the stamens as it fluttered inside the flower. It then flew to another flower close-by and as I went indoors it continued visiting blooms around the tall stems.

Evening primroses, *Oenothera*, have large yellow flowers which are fully open at dusk. There are several species which are all introduced to Britain, mostly from North America, but which are useful to have in our gardens as they do attract moths. I used to have a sweet rocket, *Hesperis matronalis*. It smelt very fragrant and always brought moths to feed on the nectar and to pollinate it on fine summer evenings.

I know a lot of people are not very keen on moths, thinking of them as rather spooky, fluttering grey creatures either to be rescued or swatted when they come indoors after dark, drawn to our lights. Finding scuttling clothes moths amongst our garments is certainly not good PR for moths. Yet most of us have no idea just how many different moths there are, even in the UK, nor how very beautiful some of them are. Let's give them a chance to shed their drab, rather negative image and see them in a new light.

It is true that most of our moths are night-flying, so not seen very often by most people. This perhaps gives them an image similar to that of bats and owls which are also crepuscular or nocturnal, unfamiliar 'things of the night', giving them traditional links with myths or spirits. In contrast, butterflies are much more popular as they are seen in daylight when their colours and patterns can be admired. What is not generally known is that there are many, many more moths than butterflies.

Just looking at Great Britain and Ireland there are only around 60 resident

butterflies compared with more than 800 species of macro-moths, which are generally the larger, more easily identified moths. There are hundreds more species of micro-moths. These are generally smaller and more difficult to identify. Many are actually impossible to identify without examining their genitalia under a microscope! Some macromoths are also not easy to identify and moths are still greatly under-recorded. However, an increasing number of volunteers, guided by specialists, are involved in recording moths across the country and in Ireland using light-traps. It is amazing to join a group of recorders after a night's trapping when they open the traps in daylight and reveal the fantastic array of moths hiding amongst the old egg cartons. So many different sizes, body forms and wing-shapes and many of them are brightly coloured or with intricate patterning. Some families set up their own moth-traps in their gardens so that children, in particular, can marvel at this natural diversity.

If, like these families, you want to learn to identify and know more about the huge variety of moths living around us but largely unseen and unappreciated, a good reference book to look at is the Field Guide to the Moths of Great Britain and Ireland. Start with the Hawk-moths which are large and stunning: the Death's Head Hawk-moth (a summer immigrant species the size of a mouse, and it even squeaks like one!), the Eyed Hawk-moth and the Elephant Hawk-moths. Then

there are the Eggar moths, the Tussock moths, the Tiger moths, and the wonderfully complex patterns of the Brocades, the Beauties, the Kittens and the Rustics.

It's also amazing to look at the great variety of caterpillars or larvae: again, the Hawk-moths are very striking and well illustrated here.

The Pocket Guide to the Butterflies of Great Britain and Ireland includes a short section on some of the day-flying moths which can surprise butterfly recorders. These can be just as attractive as butterflies: the Emperor moth, with a large 'eye' spot on each wing, the chestnut and yellow Oak Eggar moth, the Speckled Yellow moth, the Wood Tiger moth and the red and grey Cinnabar moth. I have seen the

fascinating Humming-bird Hawk-moth several times in Beaumaris gardens: it's very eye-catching as it really does behave like a humming-bird, flitting rapidly between plants and hovering to feed from tubular flowers like red valerian, phlox, petunia and buddleia. Its wings move so fast as they hover that they're just a blurr.

Looking at the day-flying moths is useful for distinguishing moths from butterflies. Butterflies have a 'club' at the tip of their long antennae whereas most moths have simpler, thread-like or feathered antennae. Another difference between butterflies and most other moths is the way butterflies generally fold their wings upright above the body when they rest. In comparison, most moths fold their wings flat and tent-like over the body.

Moths and butterflies are members of the Order Lepidoptera, 'scale-wing'. Their two pairs of wings are usually covered in tiny scales. The scales are pigmented, reflective and overlapping and it is these that give butterflies and moths their wonderful and unique variety of colours. Worldwide, there are more than 158,000 species of Lepidoptera, with more than 90% of these being moths. Mayflies and caddisflies are more distant relatives. Butterflies appeared around 100 million years ago, when flowering plants were beginning to develop so they evolved together. This resulted in many specialisms and adaptations. Many adults feed from particular flowers or types of flower. Some caterpillars only feed on certain plants. Some plants developed chemical defences against caterpillars. There are

very few fossil butterflies or moths as their bodies and wings were too fragile.

Some night-flying moths migrate over huge distances. How do they find their way in the dark? It has been shown that they navigate by the moon and stars, with some specifically using the Milky Way. They often fly several hundred metres above the ground when migrating and can fly at 50km/h. We can see that artificial lights in our homes and cities cause confusion to night-flying moths. Hunting bats do well as moths gather around street-lights. Just how much disruption artificial lights cause migrating moths is probably unknown.

As with so much other wildlife, moths are in decline. Standardised light-trap surveys throughout the British Isles, operated by Rothamsted Insect Survey between 1968 and 2002, and other later surveys, show that there have been major population declines of many species of moth, notably widespread and frequent species. Declines have been greatest in southern Britain. Major causes are thought to include habitat destruction, degradation and fragmentation and a generally greater intensity of land-use since the Second World War. Species-rich grasslands and heathlands were once much more extensive and are valuable habitats for moths and butterflies. Widespread losses of hedges and hedgerow trees have also reduced their abundance and diversity. Climate change is another factor affecting the abundance and range of butterflies and moths. Some species are extending their range further north quite rapidly and more species are reaching the UK from continental Europe, so recording, especially in southern Britain, can be quite exciting.

In the heart of Llangoed, beneath the canopy of Aberlleiniog Woods, something quietly transformative has taken root.

Funded by the Red Squirrel Trust Wales and supported by the Seiriol Alliance and Medrwn Môn, a pioneering Green Prescribing initiative is offering a gentle antidote to loneliness and anxiety... without a pill in sight.

Participants learn woodland skills, share stories, and forge new friendships, all while surrounded by birdsong and the rustle of leaves. For many, it's a lifeline.

"We see people come alive here," says one of the organisers. "It's a small

group, but they get so much from our sessions. The woods offer peace, connection, and a sense of purpose."

Menai Suspension Bridge

It's unacceptable that, once again, we find ourselves in this situation.

The latest closure of the Menai Suspension Bridge shows a clear failure of proper planning from the Welsh Government, and a lack of real investment in our transport system from successive UK Governments.

When I was Leader of Isle of Anglesey County Council in 2023, I put forward clear, evidence-based plans to improve the island's connections. These plans were fully supported by the Council's Executive and showed that our economy and local wellbeing depend on strong, reliable links to the mainland. Sadly, two years later, those warnings have been ignored.

The Menai Strait crossings are vital: they are a part of a major European trade route between Holyhead and Dublin. Yet while other parts of the UK see huge investment in brand new transport links, we are left dealing with ageing bridges

and repeated closures.

Local businesses are being hit hard. Until we have long-term solutions, there should be a dedicated resilience fund to help communities and businesses cope while these vital links remain vulnerable.

Ynys Môn deserves better than shortterm fixes. It needs a clear resilience strategy from both Cardiff Bay and Westminster, one that secures reliable connectivity, supports our Freeport and energy ambitions, and protects this vital trade and transport route for generations to come.





Llanddona Tractor Rally

Last of all, this excerpt from Lucy Low's forthcoming article on the Llanddona Tractor Rally was much too important not to be squeezed in:

A big shout out to everyone who helps and supports this annual event in the village of Llanddona. A fantastic figure of £3,500 was raised on the day, the money being donated this year to local charities and good causes.

My bezzie Little Lucy has had a rough few months. She started to limp in the summer, and an X-ray showed that the problem was something called Legg-Calvé-Perthes disease (LCP) in her left hip. It was all too complicated for me, even though I'm a Canine Genius, so my Dogtation Boss dogtated this bit to me...

LCP is a relatively uncommon painful condition that affects the hip. It is also known as avascular or aseptic necrosis of the femoral head. In LCP there is poor blood supply to the 'ball' part of the hip joint which causes the bone to die and crumble and leads to a stiff, very painful hip joint. This causes the dog to limp and eventually develop arthritis. It appears in small-breed dogs, including toy breeds and terriers, nearing skeletal maturity; Little Lucy's first birthday is on 13 November.

There were two options, a femoral head and neck excision (FHNE) or a hip replacement. The latter wasn't a good idea, apparently, because there's not enough bone mass in such a small dog: Little Lucy is small, even for a Westie, at just over 7.25kg. FHNE surgery involves removing the damaged section of hip bone and socket. After its removal, fibrous tissue fills the space and forms a 'false' joint. This isn't as flexible as a normal hip joint, but allows the dog to walk pain-free and will not usually affect its day-to-day movement. Little Lucy had a FHNE operation on 1 August and started hydrotherapy treatment three weeks later. There: now it's back to me.

The People told me nothing about what was in store for my bezzie when she visited us at the beginning of August. Off she went in the morning, back she came in the evening... and what a fright she looked! She had a huge plaster and a lot of her fur shaved off... a real Patchwork Pup! She didn't want to speak to me; she just wanted to sleep, and I don't blame her. She was much more herself the next day, though, and after her breakfast we went for a very slow and

gentle walk, very slow because she was hopping on three legs.

She came to visit us again in September, and what a difference! Her scar was beginning to disappear as her fur grew, and she was bouncing about like mad... her Boss has to slow her down to make her walk on four legs so that the hip is exercised gently, otherwise she hops about a bit like a kangaroo...

Do you know what? She started to dogtate at me the moment she walked in through the front door! She may be my bezzie, but she's just too much for a mature diva like me, so I try to ignore her as much as possible. I've decided that I'm going to hand over to her completely after Christmas; it'll give me a bit of peace.

Little Lucy here! That old wisepants Edie is so unkind, you know, because all I wanted to do is play with her. She won't have it, though, and growls at me, so I told her I was taking over *now*, so there! I won't be dogtating much this time, though, because the Boss has said that I should show you some pictures of me at one of my weekly hydrotherapy sessions.



This is me in the big pool with Esme... I was very splashy, but I didn't really mind the water because everybody at Mochdre Vets is very kind to me



Here they're showing how my exercises should be done, and below I'm on the treadmill; Esme holds me while the treadmill moves, so I have to walk...



I enjoy the sessions, and I have to do regular exercises twice a day as well. The Boss massages my leg afterwards, and I like that because I feel dozy afterwards and want to go to sleep.

Oh dear. The Boss has told me that I'm at the bottom of the page, which means that you'll have to wait till February to read about how I'm getting on... bye bye!
