
THIS MONTH'S COVER PICTURE Philip Snow





BEAUMARIS HEALTH CENTRE: FLU CAMPAIGN 2021

Having the annual flu vaccination is your best protection against becoming unwell with flu. It is extremely important to have this, particularly because of the additional worries about COVID-19. People at risk of flu are also at higher risk of COVID-19 and its complications... so, a very simple message from us this autumn: please book your flu vaccination now if you haven't already done so.

You can book on-line (using *My Health Online*, which may be easier and more convenient for you) or by phone on 01248 810818. Our phones are extremely busy so please bear with us.

A few things to remember if you have a booked appointment for flu:

- Ensure that you bring and wear a mask
- Do not attend if you are, or someone you live with is, unwell or has any COVID-19 symptoms, or you have been in contact with COVID or have been advised to isolate
- Please wear a short-sleeved top to allow easy access to your upper arm/shoulder
- Come alone where possible

A reminder of the groups of people that are recommended a flu vaccination:

- There's a new group this year, anyone aged 50 years or over: this is everyone aged 50, not just those with health conditions
- All diabetics, asthmatics or COPD, heart disease, liver disease, kidney disease, main Carers
- Anyone with a BMI of over 40
- Anyone who is pregnant
- All children aged 2-3 years

COVID Boosters are currently being organised by the Betsi Cadwaladr Health Board Vaccination team. Letters are being sent out by them directly. The letters are sent out several weeks in advance so you will have plenty of notice. Please do not delay your flu vaccine because you are waiting for the COVID Booster. There is no problem having these close together, and there is no gap needed between the two vaccines.

If you have queries please contact the telephone number on the Booster invitation letter. We are quite limited in how we can assist with this. Housebound patients will be contacted by the vaccination team in due course.

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RECYCLING SOFT/'PROBLEM' PLASTICS

At long last it's becoming possible to recycle soft/'problem' plastics.

Soft plastics are lightweight plastics that often cannot be placed in domestic recycling bins at home, plastics like the peel-back film lids on yogurt pots, soft fruit bags and ready meals, and plastic crisp packets, salad bags and chocolate or biscuit wrappers.

Recycling Recycling soft plastics is easy enough:

- · Clean it: first of all, rinse it or wash it
- Scrunch it up tight: if it springs back, it's a useful indicator that it's soft plastic
- Recycle it: take it to a supermarket soft plastics recycling point

Composting Organisations like *Which*? have started to use compostable packaging for sending out magazines by post. They're useful for use as dog-poo bags, but make sure that they're not torn...

Waitrose & Partners use compostable bags for loose fruit and vegetables. They're useful for collecting compostable kitchen waste, and really do degrade very quickly in a compost bit.

CWLWM SEIRIOL: SUMMER UPDATE

Following on from Simon Hunt's piece about Cwlwm Seiriol's Ash Dieback Recovery Plan in **The Puffin** 36 (May 2021), there have been an on-line presentation and three outside training sessions to help people recognise signs of the disease and to encourage involvement in a project to monitor resistant trees within the Seiriol Ward. The idea is to look out for and monitor ash trees that appear healthy and to record these on the Cwlwm Seiriol page on the Cofnod website. Cofnod is one of four Local Environmental Records Centres (LERC) in Wales, and their task is to bring together individual records into a centralised database. If you would like to get involved, please contact me.

If you've been to the Cyttir Mawr Local Nature Reserve in Llandegfan recently, you might have noticed the bat boxes made by members of the Youth Club in Llandegfan, using kits supplied by the Cwlwm Seiriol project. The wooden pieces were made by Canolfan Byron, a centre in Mona that supports adults with learning difficulties to learn woodworking skills. The boxes are a type that allow them to be monitored from the ground using a torch so as not to disturb the bats. The youth group were able to see their boxes being put in place and learn more about the lives of bats during an evening visit on 1 July.

Jean Matthews and volunteers from the Gwynedd Bat Group kindly came along to the Aberlleiniog Local Nature Reserve in Llangoed on 28 August to lead a bat walk, and it was lovely to have so many local people attend. It was International Bat Night 2021, and we were lucky enough to see and hear a number of different bats using bat detectors. This event follows on from the bat monitoring that has been undertaken on site. Bats are a species which are likely to be impacted by the prevalence of ash dieback in the area and the resultant potential loss of roost sites when the trees are removed from the landscape.

Back in July we held an event in Llanddona to celebrate National Meadows Day. There was a variety of activity sessions including creative writing, willow weaving, meadow creation, conservation grazing, and even outdoor yoga. The Llanddona Wildflower Trail was launched on the day, too, and those attending the wildflower walk were given a copy of the leaflet, and there was a botanist on hand to shown how to identify some of the wildflowers along the route. The event was organised in partnership with Plantlife's Magnificent Meadows project. The idea was not only to promote and celebrate meadows but also to increase community awareness of the work that the Cwlwm Seiriol Project has been doing to restore and manage areas of meadow within the village and to talk about the conservation grazing element of the project.

Over the summer holidays, we worked in partnership with Ffrindiau Llangoed and Menter laith Môn to provide some Summer Fun sessions in the Aberlleiniog local nature reserve. The main aim of these was to reconnect children with their natural environment in a fun way and to encourage creativity, physical activity and play.

The Cwlwm Seiriol volunteers have been busy and have completed some very important tasks this year. People might not realise that a lot of management work is needed to ensure that habitats are kept in a favourable condition for wildlife and that there is good public access to and within the local nature reserves. Some of the things that have been done since June include preparation work for the bracken rolling and conservation grazing at Llaniestyn Common, Himalayan balsam removal and work to alleviate drainage problems along a footpath in Llangoed, creating willow bundles to stabilise wet areas of footpath in Llanddona and work to create a circular walking route, Cylch Cyttir, in Llandegfan. Scything and peening training sessions have been popular, with a renewed interest in this traditional method of cutting vegetation. During August, work to fell some of the small ash trees with die-back disease in Aberlleiniog was started; this work and the coppicing of some the other trees will continue throughout the winter months.

Unfortunately, there have been instances of fly-tipping on all of the local nature reserves this year. It is such a shame that some people do not recognise the importance of these places and choose to treat them like rubbish dumps. Fly-tipping is an offence under the Environmental Protection Act 1990, s.33, and those responsible could face a hefty fine. Fly-tipping is harmful to the environment, polluting, unpleasant to look at, anti-social and costly to clear up. This includes garden waste which has the effect of increasing nutrient content leading to growth of plants like nettles, docks and brambles. There is also the problem of introducing Invasive nonnative species such as crocosmia or montbretia, as these take over from the native species and are generally better at growing in the enriched environments that the more fragile native species.

As many of you already know, the aim of the Cwlwm Seiriol project is to help people reconnect with nature and support communities to improve the natural environment in ways that bring enjoyment, health benefits and longterm sustainability for future generations. DEFIBRILLATORS: SOME USEFUL INFORMATION

Andrew Perrott

Defibrillators are there for a purpose, and the hope is that you'll never have to use one.

What is a defibrillator? A defibrillator is a device that gives a high-energy electric shock to the heart of somebody who is having a cardiac arrest. This high-energy shock is called defibrillation, and it's an essential part of trying to save the life of somebody who's having a cardiac arrest. A defibrillator may also be referred to as a defib, an AED (automated external defibrillator) or a PAD (public access defibrillator).

One of the commonest causes of cardiac arrest is a condition called ventricular fibrillation and a cardiac defibrillator reverses this to a normal heart beat by delivering an electric shock across it.

Cardiac defibrillators in Seiriol Ward

There are 14 cardiac defibrillators in the Seiriol Ward area. See **The Puffin** 37, page14, for details of where they're situated.

4 steps to take if somebody is having a cardiac arrest A cardiac arrest can happen to anybody, at any time. The following steps give someone the best chance of survival. If you come across someone who's having a cardiac arrest:

- 1. Call 999; make sure that you **ask for a key code**
- 2. Start CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation)
- 3. Ask somebody to bring a defibrillator if there's one nearby; if nobody is available to get one, listen to the emergency operator for instructions
- 4. Turn on the defibrillator and follow its instructions



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ANGLESEY'S RED SQUIRRELS Robert Macaulay

Red squirrels are now an iconic species for Anglesey, an attraction for visitors and residents alike and an exemplar of community-led conservation.

Like elsewhere in the UK, Anglesey's red squirrels were on the brink of extinction due to the invasive non-native grey squirrel, with just 40 surviving in Pentraeth forest when, through a citizens' intitiative, their decline was reversed. Now they number over 800 and are seen in gardens, parks and woodlands across the Island.

The highly-endangered red squirrel is rightly protected by law but ironically its woodland habitat is not. Cop26 aside, conservationists are deeply concerned about this contradiction, and are petitioning for change in the law to give equal protection to red squirrel woodlands from careless felling.

This is particularly significant for Anglesey, which has only about 4% woodland cover, about a third of the average for Wales, yet it now boasts the highest number of red squirrels. Red Squirrels Trust Wales http://www.redsquirrels.info/

NATURE NOTES Roz Hattey

Good naturalists are almost always regular, organised observers who make detailed, clearly dated notes. They are invariably passionate about their studies as well.

Famous naturalists of this kind include the 18th century parson, Reverend Gilbert White of Selborne, in Hampshire, whose book, *The Natural History and Antiquities of Selborne*, has been very popular ever since its publication in 1789. It has never been out of print, with more than 300 editions to date. It is beautifully written and paints a picture of pre-industrial England. White's work is also seen as an early contribution to the study of ecology and the links with climate.

Another renowned – and even earlier – naturalist was Edward Lluyd (often spelt Llwyd), from a long-established Welsh family in south-west Wales. He worked in the famous Ashmolean Museum in Oxford and travelled widely across the British Isles and Brittany. He listed the flora of Snowdonia in 1688 and one of our rare Arctic-alpine flowers, the Snowdon Lily, formerly *Lloydia serotina* (now *Gagea serotina*), was named after him. So, too, was Cymdeithas Edward Llwyd, the national naturalists' society of Wales, still going strong. Llwyd is also famous for publishing the first ever catalogue of English fossils, in 1699, funded by his friend Isaac Newton.

In recent times, there have been many fine naturalists, some whose jobs have involved work in the natural world, others who have become excellent amateur recorders. Some have gone on to become skilled nature writers and broadcasters, notably Richard Mabey, lolo Williams, Chris Packham and, of course, Sir David Attenborough.

My own local observations are mostly irregular and are really just lucky bonuses out on my daily walks. I encourage myself by finding that any interesting, unusual or particularly vivid observations are worth recording and sharing with others. Here are a few observations made since the last number of **The Puffin**.

10 July: a friend spotted a pair of small wading birds running up and down the little fan-shaped beach by the pier in Beaumaris. He also found several beautiful olive-green, spotted eggs amongst the very sparse vegetation along the higher section of the beach. I confirmed these were ringed plovers...not a good place for them to choose to nest, on a tiny, busy beach which people were using every day! As ringed plovers normally begin breeding in April or May, these birds had probably already been displaced from another breeding site. Sadly, it seemed there was nothing to be done here and the birds disappeared after a couple of days.

Ringed plovers breed on beaches around the British and Irish coasts and can be seen throughout the year as it is a widespread resident. In winter, numbers are increased when migrants from Europe join them. In the UK, however, breeding pairs of ringed plover have decreased, largely due to disturbance and habitat loss. Of even more concern, the species has been added to the Red List under the Birds of Conservation Concern (2015) because

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of increasingly marked declines in wintering populations.

14 July: walking with friends on Mount Field on a beautiful summer evening, we were excited to watch (with binoculars) a spectacular sight in the Strait far below. Around fifteen red-breasted mergansers were fishing in the shallows at low tide, not quietly standing to watch for a fish as herons do, but running and flying fast together through the small waves, all in the same direction, darting, bobbing and diving into the water as they followed and caught some of the shoaling fish.

Sometimes one would lift itself above the water to flap its wings and stretch its long neck and sharply pointed bill, possibly as it swallowed a fish. There's a fascinating description of this fishing technique by this species in Mexico, on an incoming tide. It's described as "cooperative feeding behaviour". They are handsome, streamlined diving ducks with long, narrow bills which have sawlike 'teeth' for gripping slippery fish.

16 July: it was a hot, humid evening with a mixed flock of black-headed gulls and herring gulls wheeling overhead, catching flying ants, which always seem to take to the wing in this weather. Both male and female ants develop wings so they can leave their nests and swarm in great numbers to mate.

I have been struck this year again by the apparent absence of bats feeding on flying insects over the castle moat on warm summer evenings. I used to watch them regularly flitting and swooping over the water at dusk. Someone has suggested that since the moat was dredged so thoroughly a few years ago the freshwater ecology is likely to be much poorer now and hence fewer midges and other insects emerging from the water. There seems to be a dearth of moths, too, flitting under the trees in the castle floodlights. These also used to attract bats. Has anyone else seen bats over the moat recently?

27 August: friends stood on the limestone pebble storm-beach at Penmon watching a lone gannet diving for fish, maybe mackerel. It circled and dived repeatedly for about quarter of an hour. They were thrilled by its agility and speed. Adult gannets are large, mostly

They breed on steep sea-cliffs and islands, and the UK and Ireland together support 70% of the world's population. They will fly more than 250 miles from their nests in search of fish. 'pockets' of which are often indicated by the presence of dolphins, whales or fishing vessels. As they can fly long distances for food gannets are thriving, doing much better in recent years than other sea-birds such as puffins or kittiwakes, which are dependent on fish populations closer to their breeding colonies. Climate change is partly responsible for declining fish stocks around some of our coasts, with a knock-on effect on sea-bird colonies. The lone gannet at Penmon may have been one of this year's young on its way to the African coast.

3 September: a long walk around Rhoscolyn's coastal heath and cliffs with a friend. A cloudy day, but we watched and heard several chough. Also a small gathering of wheatears, popping up on rocks to watch us and call out 'chackchack', then disappearing as we approached. These smart little birds are summer migrants and would soon be leaving for Africa, too, mostly flying at night. As we sat to eat our snack on heathy ground looking out over small islets where cormorants were resting, swallows swooped low around us and red admiral butterflies darted about. Our natural finale was provided by a large flock of about fifty goldfinches flying past us. filling the air with their tinkling calls and landing to feed on a large expanse of thistledown in the adjacent field.

9 September: a friend reported seeing a kingfisher at Aberlleiniog today. Lovely to know they are about.

15 September: a warm, calm day. About mid-day, people were watching about thirty house martins at the front of Victoria Terrace in Beaumaris. They were perching along the ledge below the main apex, then flying out over the Green. Much twittering. Soon they will be flying south, across the Sahara Desert to South Africa. Bon voyage, little

beauties! I do hope your local nest-sites will still be here for you when you return next spring.

18 September: a warm, cloudy, very humid day again. Rain forecast. Entomological notes. Neglect or lazy gardening often help wildlife! I'm glad I still haven't 'tidied up' the hedge, as the ivy flowers have been alive with pollinators all week: honey bees, bumble bees, hoverflies and others. The buddleias I didn't prune in March have had a mass of flowers: bumble bees and butterflies still linger on the last of them, mostly small tortoiseshells now. Around the trees and shrubs speckled woods have been mating again.

Small wasps have been nesting this summer somewhere behind a hole in the woodwork in my old shed; they found the door wouldn't quite close any more. They are not the common wasp, *Vespula vulgaris*, that we love to hate at this time of year. They take no notice of me and the adjacent window open into the house as they speed in and out of the shed. They are busy foraging in my garden and beyond. One has just captured a spider in the hedge that I'm trimming, wrapped it up into a little ball and flown off with it. A second spider approached then beat a hasty retreat!

There are many different species of wasp native to Britain. some unrecognisable as wasps to most of us, with no black and yellow stripes and in a vast array of shapes and sizes, occurring in a wide range of habitats and behaving in many different ways. Some are solitary and can be tiny, but the larger, social wasps live in large colonies in nests built of wood pulp. There are three genera of 'social wasps', one of which is the Vespula group which includes the common wasp and the very similar, much rarer Austrian cuckoo wasp! Other wasps in this same broad family, the Vespidae, are known as potter wasps (see The Puffin 33, page 11) and mason wasps, most of which also have black and yellow stripes.

Autumn fruits have been very prolific this year. There are abundant hips on the roses – briars, rugosa, rubrifolia and Frau Dagma alike – the hawthorns are covered in haws, which might be good feeding for migrant redwing later, and everyone seems to have a great crop of damsons, attracting butterflies and wasps as they ripen and open up or fall to the ground. Blackberrying has been very productive, too, providing welcome seasonal bowls of blackberry and apple and a winter stock of jam.

BEAUMARIS: 'BEATING THE BOUNDS' John Briggs

In Spring 2022 a very unusual walk will take place. Starting at Beaumaris, it takes in a circuit of some 14 miles following the boundaries of the old Borough. This is a historical custom occurring every seven years, commonly known as 'Beating the Bounds', and has

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been exercised in Beaumaris since the original Charter of King Edward I in 1296. In centuries past its practical purpose was to acquaint each succeeding generation with the alignment of the boundaries as no maps were available, to ensure that no encroachment occurred, a serious duty that was performed at the command of the Constable of the Castle and the Mayor of the Borough.

In 1562, Queen Elizabeth I granted Beaumaris its Charter of Incorporation, giving the town Corporate status. Special reference was made in it to the extent of the Borough, and the document also gave powers to "perambulate" the Borough boundaries and also, if expedient, to cast down, destroy, break, burn all such hedges, walls, ditches, boundaries, houses, house walls, crosses and all other enclosures without any payment. The custom usually took place on the Sunday before Ascension Day, Rogation Day. The Charter says: "It shall be lawful to the Mayor, Baliffs and Burgesses of the Borough to make a presentation or perambulations of it to know superintend and limit their liberties and franchises around, within and without the borough".

Much has changed since then. We no longer beat the local boys to make sure that they remember the town limits or cast down any walls and hedges that encroach on the boundary, but ceremonies such as throwing a stone into the sea or crowning the 'Queen' at Gorslwyd provide a tangible link with our history and the traditions of the past.

At Seiriol Men's Shed we're working hard at the moment to put things in place so that we can accommodate wheelchair-users and men with mobility and other problems. We now have a tidy and well-equipped workshop, and our focus has moved to painting and sorting out a room where men can relax and chat in comfortable seating. Another room will be for art and craft projects: painting, drawing, model-making, pottery and whatever takes a member's fancy.

A Men's Shed is owned and run by its members, and it's said that the single most important item is a kettle. We try to be self-sufficient, but we cannot escape overheads like insurance, and need a little help from a grant occasionally.

We meet on a Thursday between 10.00am and 12.00 noon, and often on other days by arrangement. Come and see us, or phone Mike Thomas on 07941 103386.

Directions To find us from the direction of Beaumaris:

- Go through Llangoed, past McColl's on the right, and down the hill
- Go over the little bridge at the bottom and up the hill for about 200 yards
- Turn right at the Gerddi Haulfre Gardens sign into the Haulfre residential home car park
- Walk down towards the gardens
- Our workshop is on the left.



RECYCLING CENTRES

Anglesey has two household waste recycling centres for the use of residents:

- Penhesgyn (LL59 5RY) Pre-booking of a slot is not required at the Penhesgyn centre
- Gwalchmai (LL65 4PW) Pre-booking of a slot is required at the Gwalchmai centre
- The **Penhesgyn** centre's opening times:

Conditions

- COVID-19: no householder should attend the Penhesgyn centre if he/she or any member of his/her household/extended household has tested **positive** for COVID-19, has any symptoms, is awaiting a test result, or if he/she is required to selfisolate following advice from Test, Trace, Protect (TTP), foreign travel, or whilst awaiting medical treatment.
- Vehicle size: all vehicles must be no • longer than 5 metres and no higher than 2.1 metres, including any attachments.
- Proof of residency: householders visiting the Penhesgyn centre must bring proof of residency on the Isle of Anglesey, such as a Council Tax bill (current financial year), driving licence or utility bill (no older than 3 months). With the vehicle stationary, the proof of residency should be held up to the windscreen/closed window to allow a Council staff member to inspect it through the glass to ensure compliance. The householder will not be allowed access to the site if he/she does not provide the required proof of residency.
- Track, Trace, Protect: householders will be required to comply with Track, Trace, Protect (TTP) requirements. The Penhesgyn centre will have QR code signs present to allow householders to confirm their attendance using a scanning process.

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THE HOLLIE GUARD APP Andrew Perrott

The subject of women's safety has been prominent in the media recently, and rightly so. Quite by chance I saw a Facebook post recently about something called the *Hollie app* and did some research on it.

The Hollie Guard Trust The Hollie Gazzard Trust was created following the murder of 20year-old Hollie Gazzard in 2014 by an expartner. Set up by her parents Nick and Mandy and her sister Chloë, the charity helps reduce domestic violence through creating and delivering programmes on domestic abuse and promoting healthy relationships to schools and colleges.

The ultimate aim of the Trust is to change the lives of young people positively through partnerships in communities, as well as working alongside other charities and professional agencies.

The Hollie Guard app If the user of this app feels concerned or insecure he/she can shake his/her phone and alert key contacts. The app will start recording audio and visual information which will be saved and sent to emergency contacts, so that they can call emergency services on the user's behalf if required. A repeated shake by the user will set off a flashing light and high-pitched audio alert.
